

UM GENERAL CONFERENCE 2019

Several months ago the Council of Bishops called a Special Session of the General Conference of The United Methodist Church to be held February 23-26, 2019 in St. Louis, Missouri. The purpose will be to receive and act on a report from the Commission on a Way Forward based on the recommendations of the Council of Bishops. The 32-member Commission was authorized by General Conference 2016 and appointed by the Council of Bishops to examine paragraphs in The Book of Discipline concerning human sexuality and exploring options to strengthen the unity of the church.

Last fall Snoqualmie UMC spent several weeks considering scripture, tradition, reason and experience relating to the human sexuality theme. Karolann and Rev. Richard Whetsell hosted a class inviting further conversation and an overview of the "way

forward" plans under consideration at the denominational level in February. Our Pacific Northwest Conference voted a couple of years ago to welcome called and qualified candidates to the pastoral ordination process, regardless of sexual orientation....and to disregard language that still exists in the UM Book of Discipline that considers homosexuality to be "incompatible with Christian teaching." As a conference, we collectively determined that it seems more Biblically obedient to live inclusively and more truly welcoming of all people. Nonetheless in most congregations as well as the conference in full and the "global" denomination - we do not all agree on where God is with this "issue." Please include General Conference delegates from around the world in your prayers as they travel to Missouri for community discernment through General Conference 2019, February 23-26.


For much information about three plans that have been proposed for delegates to consider, visit www.pnwumc.org. At this point our Western Jurisdiction supports the "One Church Plan" which removes restrictive language from the Book of Discipline but allows for interpretive and practical flexibility in each local church. Living in the tension can be spiritually fruitful. Whatever our particular vantage point we come further alive in Grace as we all move toward the center, Jesus, the Christ.

SNOQUALMIE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH MINISTRY OF COUNSELING

As a part of our call to "become the voice, hands, and heart of Christ", SUMC has commissioned Ed Morrison, M.Div. as a minister of counseling for us and our Snoqualmie Valley community. Ed has over forty years of professional experience in pastoral and mental health counseling and is now offering his services as a volunteer through SUMC.

Pastoral ministry/counseling differs from other forms of psychotherapy ("soul healing") in that it comes from a spiritual framework as part of a religious community.

- Pastoral counseling uses a spiritual model rather than a medical model as its base. Rather than "diagnosis and cure", it seeks "change of heart and mind" (Greek: metanoia) which leads to change in action.
- Pastoral counseling uses both psychological and theological resources to deepen our understanding of
 and help with personal/relationship struggles. Since relationship conflicts (either with our true selves
 and God, or with others) are at the heart of most conflict, those in partnerships are expected to engage
 together in seeking help.



 Pastoral counseling acknowledges who we are as physical, social, and spiritual beings, and attempts to help accomplish whatever change is necessary to improve and heal relationships with others or our internal conflicts with ourselves.

Practicing as a Licensed Mental Health Counselor for thirty years, Ed has good connections to the mental health community and can serve as a referral source for those who may not fit the pastoral care model, or who need additional resources.

As an inclusive community, SUMC is committed to serving anyone who comes for counseling no matter their religious (or non-religious) orientation. This ministry is about care for all God's people.

SUMC's Ministry of Counseling is offered on a "give what you can" financial basis, with donations supporting our mission in the Snoqualmie Valley community.

All counseling through this ministry is held in confidence. If there is need for consultation with appropriate others, this will happen only with the consent of those being counseled.

NEW WORK HOURS FOR PASTOR LEE




