Freda Monroe was born to a Jamaican mom and a dad from Texas who also had Caribbean heritage. She was born in France and grew up in Germany and California. Her two older brothers were born in London and California. Freda's parents are her heroes: "My dad is my hero because he made me understand that I didn't have to know everything. My mom is my hero because she reminded my dad that he didn't have to know everything. They were a team. Mom was the source of creativity in the home." Freda ended up here in Washington when she came to college at University of Puget Sound Tacoma.



Freda's accomplishment in life is "still being alive." She is a survivor of cancer, seizures, and 2 mini-strokes. She lives at Red Oak in North Bend with a cat named Sunshine because "She who must be adored is all commanding." Funny things make her laugh. One of her favorites to watch is *Steven Universe*, a totally mindless cartoon where Freda won't be "assaulted with reality." She is happily learning what feeds her soul: doing art and music, growing plants, loving her cat, and engaging with some people. One of those people is Marcia Reinert, who is her hero. She says, "Marcia constantly stands up and supports those who need representation—besides being cool and fun."

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ALL MEANS ALL: CELEBRATING DIVERSITY

Santiago, the young Guatemalan man who does excellent work on our house and yard projects, has been in the U.S. for six years. When he waves to us from the yard, sipping the coffee we serve him, his bright smile warms us. He talks to us using Google Translator. He works, he tells us, in order to send money back to his wife and three children, whom he hasn't seen since he moved here. Six years without seeing his family. I can barely imagine. But he is happy.

Santiago loves Jesus. He is grateful to Jesus. Grateful for the work Jesus helps him find and for the people who hire him. Ed's a little uncomfortable that he refers to him as "Boss". Ed asks him, "If I'm 'Boss', what are you?" Santiago replies, "Worker." His smile beams even brighter when he points to the sky and says, "Big Boss. Jesús," and then points to the two of them. "Workers." Ed says Santiago is one of his spiritual mentors.

One day, when Ed was helping Santiago carry an old mattress down our stairs, I heard a distressing noise. When I ran to look, Ed was sprawled at the bottom of the stairs, his left leg extended. Santiago knelt beside him, very still, his hand on Ed's leg and a look on his face that was so sweet, it moved me. I joined them, placed my hand on Ed's shoulder. We waited, quiet, and Santiago's composure helped me stay calm.

When Ed decided he could get up, Santiago helped him. "You okay, Boss?" he said. The concern on his face was clear. Ed assured him he was all right. Santiago hugged him, and the obvious love between them made me tear up.

I heard recently that immigrants from Central America may lose their work permits. "Immigrants from Central America" no longer brings general, blurry pictures to my mind. I see Santiago. I see his family. We haven't attended a church service together, but he is part of our broader church family. Maybe someday we can worship together. I pray to the Big Boss that Santiago will stay safe, trusting, and happy.


5th Sunday Joint Worship

Snoqualmie is the home of Echo Glen Children's Center, a place where members from our church are able to offer friendship and support to youth who are incarcerated. Volunteers are needed for a variety of activities.

Our church offers a worship experience at Echo Glen on 5th Sunday months from 3:30-5:00. January 29 is our next opportunity. Participants include Jacque Lindstrand, Richard & Karolann Whetsell, Alma Gomez, Shelly Huestis, and Pastor Carrie, who has great skills with youth groups. We never know how many youth will choose to attend as they must agree to come as a "cottage" with their supervisor. One of the boys' cottages has faithfully come and asked questions and shared their personal needs for prayer. We need help to continue this ministry.

example, people are needed to sit with students while they are doing online work in the library or computer lab. Jacque Lindstrand from our church has been volunteering with a sewing class.

Mentoring at Snoqualmie Valley Schools

In comparison to their peers, youth who have a mentor are 52% less likely to skip a day of school, 46% less likely to start using illegal drugs, 37% less likely to skip a class, and will experience fewer depressive symptoms. Just by showing up faithfully, a mentor makes a difference. Mentors from our congregation include Carol Morrison, Reri MacLean, and Richard and Karolann Whetsell. Talk with one of them if you're interested, as more mentors are needed. Good training and lists of ideas and an activity box at the school provide resources for you as you mentor. Check out the video on YouTube - "Youth Success Mentoring" - for what to expect and how to get involved.

Here are some comments from those already involved:

Karolann Whetsell: I have mentored 3 elementary age girls, and visiting them has been a "call" to discipleship. As a senior citizen aka active adult, this is a way to be involved in my community and still have purpose for my life. This grandmother is a safe place for my girls to have someone really listen to everything they say.



Richard Whetsell: It's pretty simple. I just show up and my mentee decides what activity we will do.

<u>Carol Morrison</u>: I'm continually aware of how much I enjoy my 13 year old mentee. She fascinates and delights me with her array of interests, her creative mind, and her resilience in the face of a tough family situation. I get to see a child approaching her teens with both the doubts those years bring and a growing confidence she's getting from the helpers in her life. I've often thought of how much it would have meant to me to have a grownup I could relate to and trust during my turbulent young years. Mentoring is a win-win-win. My mentee gets much-needed support, I get to spend time with a precious, deserving child, and the world gets the benefit of her healthier, happier self. Win. Win. I am grateful.

Help an Afghan Refugee Family

Reri MacLean reports that her daughter, who attends Snoqualmie Valley Alliance Church, is part of a committee that has been assisting a family forced to flee Afghanistan. The original commitment was to work with the family for the initial 90 days of their relocation, although the support can continue afterward. While the family is settling into the Snoqualmie Valley community, there is still need for assistance, including legal immigration advice and tangible items.
