STEWARDSHIP 2021 - MORE BLESSED

I bet you've heard it said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." (Acts 20:35.) Nonetheless, my hope for Snoqualmie UMC this stewardship season starts with RECEVING.

With football season upon us, I picture a wide receiver carrying a

freshly caught ball across the endzone. Touchdown! Jubilation! In order to score of course the ball has to be in hand. It must first be *received*. Are we catching God's blessings?

What blessings do you receive from God through faith community? What have you received, or desire to receive? Have you known love, friendship, inspiration? Have you been blessed with relationships, spiritual stimulation, purpose, moments of real communion? Have you grown to highly value people with whom you disagree? We know that we are blessed not just for our own delight and deliverance, but *to be a blessing* for others.

So, how do you give, and desire to give? Do you show up and connect? Are you sharing yourself in the learning circle, coffee breaks, or worship breakout rooms? Are you caring for and about each other? Do you pray or knit or send uplifting notes? Do you teach, contribute to a ministry team, or change the lightbulbs? Do you give financially? Do you generously support God's work *outside* the church? These are some of the ways I know you bless with the blessings you receive. How do you hope to give in the coming year? Please be thinking about this, and watch for a stewardship letter in the mail soon.

Participating in Grace involves receiving and giving...giving and receiving. I hope this stewardship season we'll discover ourselves more blessed. More blessed in our receiving, more blessed in our giving, and the whole of God's world more blessed on the way.

RECONCILING FELLOWSHIP FORMED



The Inclusion Committee at SUMC, guided by Reconciling Ministries Network since April, 2019. has formed a Reconciling Fellowship consisting of members of our congregation who support full inclusion of lgbqt+ individuals and who agree with and honor this statement:

"We celebrate God's gift of diversity and value the wholeness made possible in community equally shared and shepherded by all. We welcome and affirm people of every gender identity,

gender expression, and sexual orientation, who are also of every age, race, ethnicity, physical and mental ability, level of education, and family structure, and of every economic, immigration, marital, and social status, and so much more. We acknowledge that we live in a world of profound social, economic, and political inequities. As followers of Jesus, we commit ourselves to the pursuit of justice and pledge to stand in solidarity with all who are marginalized and oppressed."

Everyone is invited to be a part of the Fellowship, though we understand that some may not agree with our goal to eventually become a reconciling congregation within a fully inclusive denomination. So far, thirty of our congregants have joined. The shelter plans to be open 24/7 this year instead of only overnight, and would be adhering to all the COVID precautions for homeless service providers (which are more strict than even the church's) as well as the county's usual sanitation and hygiene requirements.






TRANSGENDER DAY OF REMEMBRANCE (TDOR)


The challenge is before us. May we be guided by the Holy Spirit as we move forward. The church is at it's best when we work for justice and reconciliation.
